The Word From Father Thomas

MEDITATION OF THE DAY

Each day, every day of our lives, God presents to us the people and opportunities upon which he expects us to act. He expects no more of us, but he will accept nothing less of us; and we fail in our promise and commitment if we do not see in the situations of every moment of every day his divine will.



That is how the Kingdom of God has been spread from the time of Christ's coming until now. It depends on the faith and commitment of every man, but especially of the priest, every day of his life. Every moment of every man's life is precious in God's sight, and none must be wasted through doubt and discouragement. The work of the Kingdom, the work of laboring and suffering with Christ, is no more spectacular for the most part than the routine of daily living. Perhaps a priest experiences no spectacular priesthood successes, at least as man measures successes, no miraculous conversions, no enthusiastic displays of devotion, nothing dramatic at all. Yet he must come to believe, and be firmly convinced, that Christ is the guarantor of his success. Christ has arranged for him to be here, this day and among these peope, in order that the Kingdom of God may be advanced in this place and among these people. As a priest, he must be a witness in a special way to the power of the Kingdom to transform all things human, even the tortured and twisted, the humdrum and the seemingly insignificant.

In fact, it is the unspectacular and the seemingly hopeless that are the real challenge. For these thing, too, must be transformed and redeemed if Christ's victory is to be complete. The Kingdom of God will not be brought to fulfillment on earth by one great, sword-swinging battle against the powers of darkness, but only by each of us laboring and suffering day after day as Christ labored and suffered, until all things at last have been transformed. And this process of transformation continues to the end of time.

Dear Padre

DECEMBER 4, 2016

I have two questions about Christmas. First, why do we use red and green during the season? Second, what does the word Noël mean?

The Church uses colors as symbols to mark the change of liturgical seasons and to remind ourselves of religious themes. White (or gold) is actually the liturgical color for the Christmas season, and violet (purple) for the weeks of Advent.

Red and green were associated with a wintertime feast that predates Christianity. However, since these colors have additional meanings for Christians that relate to this time of year, they are still in use and commonly associated with the holiday (holy) season. December 28 is the feast of the Holy Innocents, the male children of Bethlehem who were slaughtered by Herod's order. It's color is red, the color of martyrs. Poinsettia flowers and candy canes, popular Christmastime accents, also prominently feature red. Greenmost visibly found in evergreen trees and wreaths—is the color of life. During Advent, it witnesses to the imminent birth of Jesus, which brings hope for new and eternal life to the world.

In response to your second question, Noël is an old French word meaning "Christmas," "the Christmas season," or "yuletide." The French word comes from the Latin for "birth" or "birthday." As we all know, Christmas is the time when we celebrate the birth of Jesus and the Incarnation of our Lord and Savior.

Good News!

December 4, 2016 Second Sunday of Advent (A) Is 11:1-10, Rom 15:4-9, Mt 3:1-12

John the Baptist was the first prophet in Israel in more than 200 years. Some even thought he was the Messiah. He preached with authority, and people traveled from all over Judea to hear his words.

His message was to prepare the way. As any pope, king, or president announces his intentions in advance so preparations can be made, John was sent to announce the coming of the Son of God and to tell the people how to prepare.

Jesus comes to the world in three different ways: first, when he was born in Bethlehem and walked the earth; second, when he comes again at the end of time; and finally, when he comes to us constantly in the sacraments and liturgy. Preparing for his arrival is not a matter of fixing roads, painting houses, or organizing a parade. Our king desires a transformed spirit: "Not by appearance shall he judge...." John warns that we cannot hide behind the faith of another; each one of us needs to show the fruits of our own faith. Yet we need not fear, for he who comes has every intention of saving us. He appears as Lord and invites us to accept his kingdom. He is also a teacher who shows us the way back to the Father. Above all he is a friend who forgives unconditionally and accepts our sincere yet feeble efforts.

This week, reflect on this image of John the Baptist, heed his words, and imitate him: Cry out for repentance, cleanse others from their sins, and prepare the way to God.

For Reflection

How does John the Baptist's call to repentance challenge me? Where do I need to ask for God's mercy?

For I tell you, God can raise up children to Abraham from these stones" (Matthew 3:9).
