SAINT OF THE WEEK BERNARDINE OF SIENA

1380-1444

Feast Day—May 20



This renowned Italian preacher was canonized only six years after he died. He was born near Siena and studied at the university there. He was ordained a Franciscan priest in 1404. From 1417 until his death 27 years later, he crisscrossed northern and central Italy as an itinerant preacher who drew enormous crowds by focusing on honest and penitential living and on reverence for the holy name of Jesus which led to the spread of this devotion. He also preached against gambling and materialism and turned down three requests to become a bishop.

PENTECOST

Pentecost marks the occasion of God sending the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples after his Resurrection. The book of Acts describes how the disciples were gathered together in one place on the day of Pentecost. The Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shavuot or the Feast of Weeks) was a day that commemorated the giving of the law to Moses, a day soon to be marked as well by the giving of the Holy Spirit. The day of Pentecost was a turning point for the disciples:

Before Pentecost, the disciples were unsure of what they were to do next and spent most of their time in hiding. After Pentecost and [receiving] the gifts of the Holy Spirit, they understood their mission to spread the Good News of Jesus, and they had the courage to come out of hiding and speak openly about who Jesus was and what he had accomplished by his dying and rising.

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the strength to fulfill their commission to spread the Good News of Jesus. The Church marks this day through a special liturgical celebration:

The Solemnity of Pentecost, on the fiftieth day of Easter, concludes the Easter season. In recent years, the Church has restored the extended vigil for this solemnity. Similar to Easter, the vigil of Pentecost includes four readings from the Old Testament, each with a proper Psalm and prayer, along with the Epistle and Gospel. At the conclusion of the Mass during the Day, the Paschal Candle is extinguished and moved to its permanent location near the baptismal font.

The Solemnity of Pentecost, which crowns and fulfills the Easter season, is a good time to pray for a deeper in-dwelling of the Holy Spirit.

2. Arrival Time: Volunteers report at 8:30 a.m
3. Ending Time: Noon
4. The Food Pantry location is across the street from the GAH in the metal storage facility located on the west side of Melvin Street. The volunteers will enter the storage facility through the alley on the west side of the storage building. Even though there is parking on the south side of the building, we ask our volunteers to park on the south side of the hospital at the corner of Melvin and Hagar Drive. This allows the parking lot next to the food distribution facility to be used by the individuals that are picking up supply and food items.

6. There will be a need for additional help to set up Friday night. Usually 6-12 people is ample.

The Word From Father Thomas



WHAT IF I HAVE BEEN AWAY FROM CONFESSIONS FOR MORE THAN A YEAR?

Someone who returns to confession after an extended absence is a source of great joy and celebration: for God and his angels (who know more joy in heaven over one sheep brought back to the fold than for ninety-nine who remained; LK 15:7); for oneself; for the Church at large—and for the priest privileged to minister God’s mercy.

Priests do not disclose the content or even that a person went to confession. Priests do occasionally confide that during a stretch of confessions, a “big fish” was caught in the net of God’s loving forgiveness. The size of the “fish” may refer to the gravity of sin or the duration someone has been away from the sacrament.

Different factors may keep one away: a previous confessor who was more harsh than merciful; infrequent opportunities at a local parish; a tendency to procrastinate; a lukewarm belief that Jesus really intends confession to be a “house specialty” on the menu of his mercy; and the fear of being “outed” as someone who is unfamiliar with the sacramental ritual. More grave is the fear that if we submit ourselves to the unconditional love of God offered in radical forgiveness, we might want to let God take possession of our will, our heart, mind, and soul.

Saint John of Avila describes one who balks at Christ’s compassion. When invited into the current of God’s mercy and reassured one would not drown, the person refuses because he or she might feel drawn to go out further and deeper, and might never want to come out at all. Yet the truth instilled in us is that we do not belong to ourselves, but to the Father of mercies who longs to save rather than condemn us.

Some practical steps to participate fully in the sacrament: technology can be a great asset, for one can readily access apps and websites that review how to go to confession, how to examine one’s conscience, and how to make an act of contrition. It is fine to bring a hand-held device into the confessional. Parish churches often stock similar resources in their pamphlet racks. To prepare and identify real sins we have committed, one could use Scripture such as the Ten Commandments (Ex 20:1-17), the Beatitudes (Mt 5:1-12), or a comparison of the works of the flesh versus the fruits of the Spirit (Gal 5:16-23)

Even if we have prepared well, we might still draw a blank when meeting the priest face-to-face. Be not afraid! God’s grace has already drawn you to the well of mercy, and the priest will happily supply prompts that will dissolve anxiety and allow the Spirit to counsel us and absolve us of all sin, restoring us to full friendship with Jesus.

The Bible on life on other planets

What does the Bible say about life outside our solar system?

The simple answer to this question is that the Bible doesn't specifically mention life on other planets. However, there are some important biblical principles that would speak to the possibility of such a discovery.

Begin with the account of creation in Genesis: "In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth..." (1:1). We believe that everything that exists was created by God. All stars, planets, minerals, plants, and animals flow from the creative activity of the Holy Trinity. If there is any type of life anywhere in the universe, it owes its existence to the God we worship. So if we discover plants, animals, or even ameba on some distant planet, we should praise our Creator for that life as we do our own.

Implicit in this question is the possibility of intelligent life, and not simply lower organisms. Are there possibly societies, technologies, or even churches on other planets? Again, the Bible does not really say. If we find intelligent life, it will not be any threat to our faith. Remember: we understand that we are created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:26-27). If there are intelligent species out there, they in no way would challenge that unique relationship. After all, the Son of God came to the earth as one of us.

Our daughter married into a large Italian family whose get-togethers include dozens of people. (More than fifty were there for Christmas dinner, and not everyone could make it.) Ours is a small and often-quiet family, so Katy had to get used to more noise and activity than she had growing up. It was like learning a new language. It's often that way when couples wed. Over time, we come to know the inside jokes, the way the in-laws mark occasions, who we can joke with and who prefers a more serious interaction. Just as with growing up in our own families, we become a part of them, and they become a part of us.

When the Holy Spirit descended on those gathered in the upper room, it was like a wedding. They had to learn the language of God's family—one that included proclamation, sharing, repentance, and mercy. They had to learn what it meant to be part of one body, using their unique gifts to build on what Christ had already started. With the Holy Spirit as inspiration and source of grace, the disciples and apostles were sent to testify and invite the world to the eternal life that Christ offers.

In any relationship it takes time to get to know the other. God has the advantage in his relationship with us—he already knows us fully and intimately. In getting to know him and learning his language, we may feel awkward or out-of-place. But he constantly welcomes and invites us to be a part of his life and Church, knowing we might eventually come to live with him forever.
