


Dinner will be served from 4:30PM-6:30PM. The cost will be \$8 with children under 12 free. Carryouts are available.

Over the next few weeks, we will present a series on Pro-Life Answers to False Pro-Choice Arguments.

This week is PART 4... "You cannot legislate morality or force your religious views on others!"

To say that laws cannot make an immoral person moral is correct. To say that we do not legislate morality is nonsense. Virtually every law is based on an idea of what is right or wrong.

Laws are not passed to control thought, but to control behavior. For example, we impose our morality on rapists. We do not care so much why rapists rape, or what their moral and religious views are, or the reason why rapists disrespect women. Rape is evil and when people want to do evil, it is clearly correct for the government to impose its morality on them. Similarly, pro-lifers do not care so much what people think about babies, as long as they do not kill them.

Indeed, if laws should not be based on morality, what on earth should they be based on? The reality is that laws are based on our collective moral values and is the way society decides which activities it will and will not tolerate.

If we are going to reject a law simply because it is supported by religion, then we would have to abolish most laws. A person does not have to be especially religious to say that it is wrong to abort a child, any more than they would say it is wrong to steal money. Certain activities are unacceptable to civilized people regardless of religious beliefs. Abortion is one of those issues. In reality, abortion is a civil rights and a human rights issue.

Let us not forget that the black civil rights movement was dominated by pastors and was often headquartered in churches. That did not make civil rights a religious issue!

The Word From Father Thomas

"...WHO WALKED IN DARKNESS..."

The "progress of peoples" is closely connected with the proclamation of Christ's message of salvation and love. Of this salvation Isaiah speaks... : *The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. Upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone.* This darkness stands for the spiritual darkness which sometimes envelops people, nations, and history itself, in its desolate mantle. Certainly the 20th century has witnessed such periods of gloom...For many people, the 20th century continues to be a time of terror, anguish and torture. From the depths of such sad experiences the human family searches for a path of grace and peace...

What kind of society is worthy of the human person? The Church responds with the unique perspective of creation history. She proclaims the truth that the Word of God, through whom all things were made, was himself made flesh and dwelt among us. He entered the world's history—our history—as a man, a human became a divine person; he took on our history and made it complete. By his Resurrection he became Lord and was given full power in heaven and on earth. Thus through the power of his Spirit, Christ is now at work in our hearts and in our world. The Spirit instills in us a cure for the world to come, but he also inspires, purifies, and strengthens those noble longings by which we strive to make earthly life more human...

In practical terms, this truth tells us that there can be no life worthy of the human person without a culture—or a legal system—that honors and defends marriage and the family. The well-being of individuals and communities depends on the healthy state of the family...

This is the way which leads to the true progress of nations and peoples; it is the path of justice and peace the light which shines in the darkness, the yoke which is easy and the burden which is light. This is where our souls will find rest.

Dear Padre

JANUARY 29, 2017

I am struggling with our new pastor. He has been in our parish for less than six months, and nothing seems to please him. Everything has to change, and the parishioners have no input. I thought the days of "pray, pay, and obey" were over.

The Code of Canon Law identifies the pastor as the shepherd of the parish. His duties require him to teach, sanctify, and govern the people entrusted to his care. However, canon law also envisions that he engage in pastoral care "with the assistance of lay members of the Christian faithful" (519). It would be fair to assert that the intention of the law is to encourage the building up of a community using the "knowledge, prudence, and integrity" of every member (228).

Many issues, feelings, and even theologues make up the personalities of a parish. The one constant that needs to be present is the presumption of good will (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2478). If that is missing, then conflict, hard feelings, and many misunderstandings will result.

Without taking sides, I suggest that everyone takes a deep breath. Then each of you—the pastor included—ask yourself, "Have I attempted to interpret this person or situation favorably? Have I made any rash judgments?" If honest and prayerful reflection reveal less-than-good intentions, now is the time to change your attitude and acknowledge that a new start is needed.

Zep 2:3; 3:12–13, 1 Cor 1:26–31, Mt 5:1–12a

To follow Christ is to seek lowliness, humility, mercy, and righteousness. The Ten Commandments summarize God's teaching to his people. Jesus gives us a new law that builds on the old. Before it was "You shall not..."; now it is, "Blessed are you when..." He calls us to greater happiness, greater blessing, but it comes with a challenge. Saint Augustine says that Jesus went up the mountain to preach the Beatitudes because he was preaching a higher moral doctrine: "greater precepts of righteousness."

The new law contradicts what our wounded human nature tends to think and feel. We are challenged to believe blessings can come from tears, meekness, and poverty; that living meekly leads to strength and security. Appreciating these truths requires transforming our minds and hearts. Faith is required. Deeply desiring and living in the right does bring satisfaction. There is consolation in mourning the things that sadden Christ's heart.

If we live by the beatitudes, many will treat us more generously. We know people who are merciful, and we are quick to show them mercy. When our hearts are clean, we can see God more clearly. Those who seek and create peace are considered by all to be children of God. They are not without trials and suffering, but they are blessed and happy.

Christ calls us to store up treasures in heaven, spiritual blessings that cannot be taken away. Even if we experience difficulty, we will still receive the highest and greatest gift: the kingdom of heaven.
