Call the Rectory at least six months before. A six month preparation time is required.




PATRIOTIC ROSARY

The Word From Father Thomas

REFLECTION

For the Fifth Sunday of Easter



While Karl Barth was lecturing, one of the students asked him a question. “Sir, don’t you think that God has revealed himself in other religions and not only in Christianity?” Barth’s answer stunned the crowd. He answered, “No, God has not revealed himself in any religion, including Christianity. He has revealed himself in his Son.” That is the real challenge of every follower of Jesus that they should see the Father in his Son. Instead of looking at Jesus, we oftentimes look at ourselves and the realities of the world. It is said, “If you look at the world you will be distressed. If you look within, you’ll be depressed. But if you look at Christ, you will be at rest.” All of us seem to know that Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life but we are unwilling to accept in our lives what we know and so we remain detached from Jesus and thus fail to see the Father who is ever present in Jesus. From our experience we know that light breaks through only when darkness has become total. Jesus uttered the words, “Do not let your hearts be troubled: when it was almost time for him to face betrayal, persecution, crucifixion and death. Even in those moments of excruciating agony, Jesus found consolation in his Father because he knew that he was doing the will of his Father. His disciples should not be worried or anxious because Jesus will go through all these and go to his Father to prepare a place for us and he will come back to take us to where he is. He will, by his suffering and shameful death, ensure a place for us in the eternal company of the Father. Let us pray that we may abide in Jesus and experience the eternal presence of the Father.

HAIL MARY SERIES

Pope Francis has encouraged the Church to look to Mary as the Mother of Mercy, praying, “Gazing toward you, our Immaculate Mother, we recognize the victor of divine mercy over sin and over all its consequences. May it reignite us in the hope of a better life, free from slavery, resentments, and fear.”

We look forward to sharing topics surrounding Mary—apparitions, the Hail Mary, and Our Lady of Fatima in the coming months. Our hope is that this series helps you grow in faith by understanding more about our Blessed Mother!!

THE STORY OF FATIMA

On Sunday, May 13, 1917, three children, Lucia Dos Santos, age nine, and her cousins Francisco Marto, age eight, and Jacinta Marto, age six, were in the fields with their sheep when they saw a flash of lightening and the image of “a lady all dressed in white. She was more brilliant than the sun and radiated a light more clear and intense than a crystal glass filled with sparkling water when rays of the burning sun shine through it.” Our Lady told the children to pray the Rosary every day to achieve peace in the world and promised to visit again the next month.



Mary returned the 13th of each month for the next **five months**, referring to herself as the Immaculate Heart. She showed the children a vision of hell and told them that if Russia converted, there would be peace throughout the world. She also explained that the pope would have to suffer and many nations would be destroyed, always emphasizing the need to pray the Rosary. She also told them that Francisco and Jacinta would soon go to heaven, but Lucia would live longer to spread the message of the Immaculate Heart. In her final visit, on October 13, Mary identified herself as the Lady of the Rosary and appeared with St. Joseph and the child Jesus, again asking that the Rosary be recited daily for peace in the world.

Are we required to disobey or break an evil law?

According to St. Thomas Aquinas, a just law has four characteristics. It must be (1) an ordinance of reason, (2) for the common good, (3) properly promulgated, (4) by a legitimate authority. If one of these elements is lacking, then the law is an unjust law and need not be followed.

According to St. Augustine, evil is a lack of something that should be there. When applied to law, if one of the four characteristics is missing, the law lacks something that should be there and is evil. An unjust law, in other words, is an evil law.

As Christians, we are generally encouraged to obey the laws of the state. As the Apostle Paul states, "Let every person be subordinate to the higher authorities, for there is no authority except from God" (Romans 13:1). At the same time, we also have the responsibility of forming our consciences according to God's revelation in Scripture and Tradition as interpreted by the divinely ordained teaching authority of the Church.

Although we are not bound to follow an unjust law, the degree to which we should actively disobey it depends on the level of evil the law promotes. Because of its serious nature, a law promoting abortion, for example, should be actively resisted through peaceful protests and appropriate legal and civil activism.

Laws that promote lesser evils need to be carefully evaluated by Church authorities and our own well-informed consciences.

Fifth Sunday of Easter (A)

Acts 6:1-7, 1 Pt 2:4-9, Jn 14:1-12

One of the greatest accomplishments of Roman construction was the arch. It enabled them to span larger distances and make bigger buildings without sacrificing strength. Just think of the Roman aqueducts, basilicas, and coliseums standing today.

The key to the Roman arch is that each stone is well cut. Additionally, the cornerstone takes all the stress and stabilizes the whole. Saint Peter uses these construction images as a metaphor for the Church. We are all living stones, built into a spiritual house founded on the cornerstone, Jesus Christ. Like the deacons in the early Church, we each have a role to play.

What is asked of a stone in a building structure? Every stone needs to be strong. It needs to be formed and shaped. Accepting and seeking formation in faith is key to finding our place in life and in God's house. A stone needs to be connected to the stones alongside it. Finally, the stone needs to accept where the master builder places it. If a stone could move itself from one place to another, there would be chaos.

Our active participation in God's plan and the Church is important. We must build on the one sure foundation and follow the plan of the master builder and those who represent him. Jesus has prepared a place for each of us in the Church and in heaven. Jesus is the way. Follow him and he will lead you to your place.
