# January 2, 2022 Epiphany of the Lord



**Today is the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord, The Manifestation of a divine being, Christ to the Gentiles by the Magi.** (The Magi, The Wise Men, The Kings from the East (Persia). Their names that we know are Balthazar, Caspar, & Melchior. They were Astrologers and their religion like many peoples from the time were looking for the Messiah (the promised of a deliverer to the Jewish nation a Savior). In Matthew gospel (2:1-12) it indicates the noble pilgrims were following the Unique, and Unusual Bright Star in the northern sky. Where they paid homage to the infant Jesus as the King of the Jews.

The distance from Persia, now Iran, to Bethlehem in Judea is about 1,412.3 miles. Remember they were traveling through the desert riding camels probably with their whole entourage, so it was a very long trip. In the Old Testament in Isaiah 60:5-7 we have a sense that some wealthy nations will be coming to adore and praise the Lord, the baby Jesus and bring him gifts of Gold, Frankincense, Myrrh.

#### Monthly Devotions for January: "Most Holy Name of Jesus"



This Feast if celebrated on January 3, 2022 — — The name Jesus was given to the Holy Child at God's command (Luke 1:31). The Holy Name of Jesus is allpowerful because of the Divine God Man person who bears it; we honor Jesus's name because of the command of Christ, that we should pray in His Name. "In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen! and because it reminds us of all the blessings we receive through our Holy Redeemer "In the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those that are in heaven, on earth and under the earth" (Phil 2:10).

**Jesus'** name was chosen in heaven and the Angel Gabriel announces it when he informs the Blessed Virgin of the incarnation: "Behold thou shall conceive in thy womb and shalt bring forth a son and thou shall call his name **Jesus**".

It is a name that has marvelous implications, for it means "Savior." The very name affirms the magnitude of **Jesus's** mission, **Jesus'** infinite love, a love that will cause **Jesus** to offer Himself up for all of us.

# Good News!

January 2, 2022 The Epiphany of the Lord (C) Is 60:1-6; Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6; Mt 2:1-12

Many traditional religions have in some way ascribed divinity to light—either they claim that light emanates from a god or that light itself is divine. This is probably because light is a primal necessity, essential for life. We find such thinking in today's readings.

"Your light has come" (Isaiah 60:1) says today's Old Testament reading. This is Isaiah's glorious message for the people of Jerusalem. The city had been destroyed; the people scattered; the future looked bleak. This message must have filled the people with hope. Not only does light bring them hope, but the light actually streams from their God. It is the Lord who shines, bestowing his radiance upon them. This light is filled with promise.

The story of the Magi is not meant primarily for children who delight in moving figurines of the three kings a bit closer to the stable every day. This is an adult story about inner darkness and enlightenment. The strangers, ignorant of ancient Israel's traditions, were able to read the signs of the times. Because of their openness, they found the Light of the World. The learned men of Jerusalem were well-schooled in the ancient promises, for they knew where to send the strangers. However, they felt threatened by these signs. They closed their minds and hearts to any omens that might imperil their positions of privilege. They had a chance to benefit from this new light, but they turned their backs on it.

#### Our Lady of Lourdes is starting 12 hours of Adoration every Wednesday beginning Wednesday January 5, 2022- with Mass at 8:00am, Adoration continuing until Benediction at 8:00pm

What is Adoration? When Catholics say they are "going to Adoration," they are typically referring to Eucharistic Adoration. Adoring, Loving, respecting, worshiping with reverence and honor the Eucharist Body of Jesus Christ. Which is the worship of the Eucharistic Body of Jesus outside of the Mass. The Eucharistic Body of Jesus is in the form of a host and is displayed in a monstrance on the altar so that all can see and pray in the presence of Christ. Adoration exalts the greatness of the Lord who made us and the almighty power of the Savior who sets us free from sin. Adoration is the love of the spirit to the "King of Glory," respectful silence in the presence of the "ever greater" God. We can show our adoration to God in many ways, but in Eucharistic Adoration, we spend time adoring the true presence of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. What Do I Do During Eucharistic Adoration?

Adoration at Our Lady of Lourdes is in the Church. As a form of respect, you should always genuflect when you see our Eucharistic Lord in monstrance on the altar. Maintain an attitude of respect, and that of others present. There may be music playing to help foster a spirit of prayer (talking with Jesus), worship, and adoration. Always keep in mind that you are in the presence of God! Kneeling, sitting, standing, and even laying on the floor before the Blessed Sacrament are all appropriate forms of prayer. Let your posture reflect your worship of the King and do what is comfortable for you. You really don't have to "do" anything during Adoration. You can just sit there and look at Jesus. Take the time to be with Him. If you are the only person in the church, don't be afraid to pray or sing aloud. This is your personal time with Christ

Let us all try to start off 2022 spending time with Our Lord, getting to know him. I know you can't come all the time but when you can Jesus will be waiting for you. There is a signup sheet in the back of Church on the table. It would be very helpful if I knew when people will be there, as Jesus is never left alone during Adoration.
